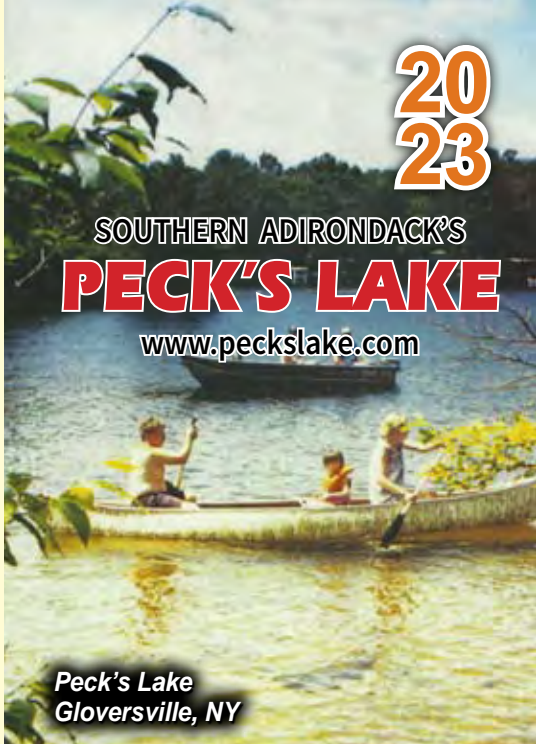

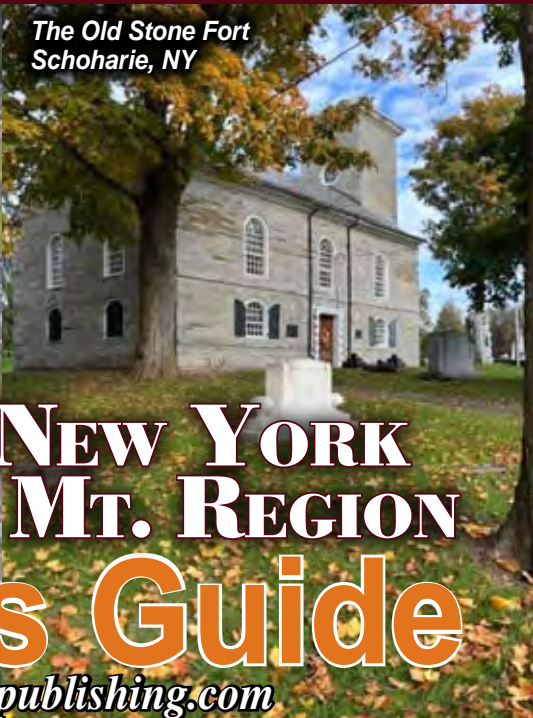

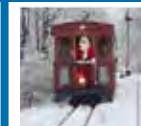

DELAWARE COUNTY

Away from the city's noise and set in the western slopes of the Catskill Mountains is a land of wooded hills and fertile green valleys, of over 700 miles of fishing streams, of covered bridges, welcoming people and beautiful vistas. This is Delaware County, Mother Nature's home in New York's Catskill Mountains.

Our rural heritage is celebrated everyday at country fairs, farm days and festivals, serving residents, recent and long-time, a genuine slice of rural life. Neighbors share a smile and a story over a cup of coffee at the local diner or on a front porch.

Each community offers diverse and reasonably priced housing in neighborhoods that are among the safest in New York State. Innovative educational resources and comprehensive health care facilities are available throughout the county.

With thousands of acres of public land and a wide variety of game habitats, Delaware County is a sportsman's paradise. Whether your enthusiasm is fly-fishing, bass fishing or hunting, Delaware County has what you're after. American fly-fishing was born in the Catskills. The West Branch and East Branch of the Delaware River are two of the area's premier trout streams and the Pepacton and Cannonsville Reservoirs of the New York City water supply are among bass and trout fishing's best-kept secrets. If hunting is your sport, Delaware County offers the best game around: bear, deer, turkey, squirrel, rabbits, game birds and everything in between.

Recreational opportunities abound at our parks, hiking and biking trails, wildlife preserves, public pools, horse trails, soccer fields and baseball diamonds. Team sports keep community playing fields filled with players and their fans cheering them on all season long.

Geographically one of the larger counties in New York State, Delaware County covers 1,460 square miles, an area larger than that of Rhode Island. It ranges from valley bottoms of 1000 feet above sea level to peaks higher than 3000 feet. Both branches of the Delaware River rise in the northeast corner—the West Branch in Lake Utsayantha, Stamford, and the East Branch in Grand Gorge—and traverse the County before joining forces in Hancock.

It was the Delaware River that first attracted early settlers to this unique area. A party of eleven Dutchmen from Hurley, near Kingston, explored the Margaretville area as early as 1762. They returned and negotiated with Chancellor Livingston to buy land in what is now Middletown for twenty shillings an acre. Early in 1763 they moved their families there. Others soon joined them to form the commu-

nity of Pakatakan.

By the start of the American Revolution, white settlements were beginning to populate what is now Delaware County. Carrying new colonizers to Delaware and even on to what was then the wild frontier of western New York State was the Catskill Turnpike, the first through route from the Hudson to the West.

The particularly vicious nature of the war waged by the infamous alliance of Joseph Brant's Mohawks and the Tories during the American Revolution all but decimated the Delaware area. After the war, however, new settlers flocked to the region and by 1794 the residents, then belonging to Ulster and Otsego counties, began agitating for separation. In 1797 the New York State Legislature formally set the area apart as Delaware County.

Lumbering and stone cutting were the first major industries in the county. The trees stood tall and straight and were highly prized by shipbuilders. The mainmast of the famous USS Constitution came from a hilltop near Walton.

Agriculture came to replace these industries in prominence and Delaware County became internationally known for the high quality of its dairy products.

It was here in Delaware County in the 1840's that the final episodes of the "Anti-Rent War" took place, bringing an end to a feudal tenant system and leading directly to the passage of the National Homestead Act.

Delaware County also became a rural retreat for urban tourists from New York City as railroads brought guests to local boarding houses. Vacation resorts began to develop as clean air, fresh food and beautiful vistas lured city dwellers. The visitors and artists who traveled throughout the Catskills introduced urban tastes and culture and began a phenomenon that blended long-standing practices and assimilated styles, which continues today.

Our history is filled with stories of individual heroism and community accomplishments. Such events as bring-a-dish suppers, barn raisings and town hall meetings are all reminiscent of those customs believed to be forgotten years ago. Yet, these are everyday occurrences in Delaware County.

Our home is a special place. Beautiful vistas, welcoming people, innovative educational resources, varied cultural amenities, safe communities and a commitment to economic growth and development all within a few hours drive from major metropolitan centers make Delaware County an ideal place in which to live and work.

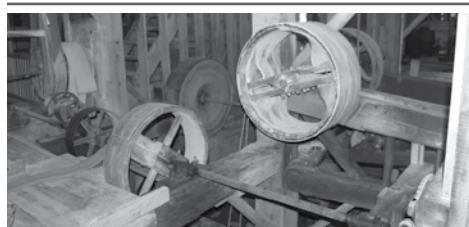

Recreation

The Herkimer County area offers an inexhaustible number of leisure time activities. Whether indoor or outdoor, the opportunities for entertainment are practically endless. In addition to the many attractions found just minutes from home, residents are within an hour or two of every other region of the state except Long Island.

Golf

There are over 40 golf courses, public and private in the Herkimer County area. There are both 9 and 18 hole courses, and half of them are par 70 or better courses. More than 6 driving ranges, one of them indoors, and around 15 miniature golf courses dot the landscape.

Hunting/Hiking

Part of the lure of Herkimer County is the ability to get out in the woods and back to nature. Miles and miles of trails crisscross the county and offer the hiker a wide variety of terrain and scenery to satisfy even the most discerning enthusiast. Hunting and trapping are a part of the history of our area. Native Americans and our early settlers began this proud tradition. Hunters are, of course, aware that this area was the home of Eliphalet Remington whose name still appears on guns made in Herkimer County. Deer, bear, rabbit, fox, beaver, wild turkey, pheasant and grouse all provide the hunter and trapper a challenge.

Winter Sports

Cross country skiing, downhill skiing, snowmobiling, snowboarding and snowshoeing are all a part of winter in Herkimer County. There are literally hundreds

of miles of groomed and maintained snowmobile trails as well as miles of both groomed and make-your-own trails for cross country skiing. McCauley Mountain in Old Forge offers a challenge as well as panoramic scenery for the downhill skier. There are also trails open for three and four wheel vehicles. There are many winter vehicle sales and service outlets throughout the County

Water Parks

The Enchanted Forest — Water Safari is an amusement park/water park. It is the largest water park in New York and is located within Old Forge, in the Adirondack region. With 31 heated water slides and rides. It has been rated the number four waterpark in the US.

Fishing/Boating

Lakes and streams abound in the County. The Fulton Chain of Lakes is a pleasure boat paradise with over 12 miles of continuous lake travel. The Erie Canal also offers boaters a unique journey back to old canal days. Canoeing, kayaking and rafting are also part of the many water sports. Fishing has a long history here. Lakes, streams and rivers abounds with native fish. The West Canada Creek is considered by many to be one of the best trout fishing streams in NY State. Brook and lake

trout, bullheads, whitefish, large and small bass, perch and sun fish are plentiful in our streams and rivers.

The Arts Munson

The single largest artistic resource in the area is the Munson Williams Proctor Arts Institute in Utica. Students and visitors alike are afforded the opportunity to both appreciate and create works of art through its Museum, School of Art and Performing Arts Division. The museum is home to a variety of American and European art, including Pablo Picasso and Thomas Cole. Located next door to the MWP, is Fountain Elms, the Victorian ancestral home of the institute's founders.

The MWP's Great Artist Series brings the world's greatest performers to the stage of the magnificently restored Stanley Performing Arts Center.

In addition...

For other musical tastes, there is the Chamber Music Society of Utica, the Mohawk Valley Choral Society, and the Glimmerglass Opera House in Cooperstown.

Lighter musical fare can be enjoyed at venues such as the Kirkland Arts Center Coffeehouse, the Mohawk Valley Center for the Arts in Little Falls and the Utica Memorial Auditorium, which regularly features some of the biggest names in pop, country and rock music. Jazz enthusiasts frequent Tiny's in Utica for legends like Maynard Ferguson and Chuck Mangione, who lives just a few hours away near Rochester. The Players of Utica, one of the oldest community theatre groups in the country, regularly present productions as does the Iliion Theatre Club.

Transportation Highways

Herkimer County's industrial corridor is served by the New York State Thruway (1-90) in an East-West direction. Access to the Thruway which allows tandem trailer traffic, is available at exits 29A in Little Falls, 30 in Herkimer and exit 31 in nearby Utica.

CENTRAL ADIRONDACKS

The Town of Webb is the largest township of New York State, in the heart of the Central Adirondacks and encompasses six North Country hamlets - Beaver River, Big Moose, Eagle Bay, Old Forge, Stillwater and Thendara. During the summer, Old Forge and its sister hamlets offer all the water sport opportunities you could wish for - swimming, power boating and waterskiing, sailing, canoeing or kayaking, and fishing for Lake, Brook, Brown or Rainbow Trout, Tiger Muskie, Small and Large-Mouth Bass, landlocked Salmon and various Panfish.

Campers can hook up their RV's or pitch their tents at the Old Forge Camping Resort, Singing Waters Campground or Nicks Lake State Campsite. Or, for a true Adirondack wilderness camping experience, reserve a lean-to site on Alger Island, accessible only by water. Hikers will enjoy numerous trails, including the ever popular and easy 40-minute trek to the top of Rondaxe Mountain (aka Bald Mountain), with its firetower and panoramic views of the Fulton Chain. Or take the scenic chairlift ride up McCauley Mountain - a spectacular vantage point to take in the wondrous fall foliage of the Central Adirondacks.

In the winter, McCauley Mountain's chairlift services 21

downhill skiing trails and glades, and offers miles of groomed cross-country trails. Snowshoeing is also a wonderful way to explore the snow covered landscape. Old Forge, known as the "Snowmobile Capital of the East," offers hundreds of miles of well maintained and groomed snowmobile trails, attracting snowmobilers from all over the country. Recently the snowmobile trails have been opened in the summer to hikers and mountain bikers, allowing visitors an opportunity to enjoy the beauty of the Adirondacks while testing their skills on unique and diverse terrain.

When you're not exploring the Adirondack wilderness, Old Forge will entice and entertain you with a multitude of events, attractions and activities. You'll find thrills and fun at the Enchanted Forest/Water Safari, with 31 heated water slides and rides. Enjoy mountain and water panoramas on Old Forge Lake Cruises, or you can board the Adirondack Scenic Railroad at Thendara Station and enjoy pristine woodland views rolling by your window and cross the old trestle bridge over the Moose River.

You can get into the swing of things with 18 of the most picturesque holes of golf at the Thendara Golf Course. Meanwhile View, the Arts Center in Old Forge, continues a 50-year tradition of arts in the Adirondacks, offering numerous exhibits, including the nationally recognized Annual Adirondacks National Exhibition of American Watercolors. Try visiting Old Forge's History Corner, the Goodsell Museum, where the Town of Webb's history lives offering free admission year round. And if that's not enough, there always seems to be a community-sponsored

The Richfield Springs Scenic Railway A railroad comes back to life in upstate New York

We often hear about historic railroad lines being abandoned, but not the Richfield Spring Scenic Railway. Over the last several years, they have been adding new track as part of a scenic railway park project. The story began in 1868 when the Utica, Chenango and Susquehanna Valley Railroad first built the railroad and chugged into town with its passenger trains in 1870.

In future years, the railroad was absorbed to become the Richfield Springs Branch of the mighty Lackawanna Railroad, the Branch grew to become a lifeline for the towns along the 3-county route served by the railroad. Passenger service was available until 1937, with freight service continuing until the 1980s. Towns covered by the Richfield Springs Branch, West to East are: Bridgewater, Plainfield, Winfield (Town and Village), Columbia, and Richfield.

The railroad tracks were removed in 1995 and the towns along the way no longer had the option of railroad service. Things changed in 2009 when 2 area business men purchased the railroad from the successor railroad company. With the 18.5 miles of the old railroad under active management the new railroad would spring back to life once again and in the Fall of 2020 the Utica, Chenango and Susquehanna Railroad once again became a recognized Federally designated railway company.

Work started slowly between 2009 and 2020, first with addressing property management issues associated with acquiring an 18+ mile railway. Next, railroad equipment had to be obtained, in order for the new owners to even consider the idea of running trains. Materials and equipment were purchased from a variety of places, including rails from a North Carolina furniture factory and a steam engine from New Hampshire. Oh, and let's not forget purchasing the Frontier Town passenger train on Ebay!!

South Columbia, in upstate New York, is now the hub of the new UC & SV railroad, where the headquarters and train shed are located. Tracks began to reappear in 2018 as part of a test track project for the Frontier Town train, which included the construction of a train shed, passenger train yard, and track up to a high bridge over Mink Creek.

Recent years of track-building projects have created a 1-mile travel experience over three bridges where travelers can experience the beauty of the "Great Cedar Swamp" on the narrow-gauge tourist railroad, constructed and operated by the Richfield Springs Scenic Railway.

The Richfield Springs Scenic Railway now operates year-round with a variety of passenger train experiences. The Railway is contained within the Lackawanna Trail Park operated by the UC & SV Railroad company. The Park is devoted to the conservation of the natural habitat and eco-friendly practices.

The Railway's most-popular summertime nature explorer "Adventure" trains utilize vintage railroad cars and "locomotive #5," which came from the Frontier Town Theme Park in North Hudson, NY. Hikers can ride to the West End platform to start their journey or can depart on foot from the train museum/ticket office located in the old Newark Milk & Cream Building.

There are special event excursions throughout the year on holidays and full moon evenings, as well as Friday evening "Sunset Cruise" trains during the summer months. Group tours and private party trains are available throughout the year. Check out the Richfield Springs Scenic Railway – New York's ONLY narrow-gauge tourist railroad. History of Canajoharie/Palatine Bridge

Early settlers from the Palatinate area of Germany began settling on the north side of the Mohawk River in 1723. The original population of Mohawk Indians was mostly driven out of the area during the American Revolution. At the construction of the bridge in 1798 spanning the Mohawk River the community received its combined name of Palatine Bridge. Incorporation as a village occurred in 1867.



The small settlement on the south side of the river was known as “Roof’s Village”. After the Revolution, this settlement was renamed Canajoharie (its original Iroquois name) which referred to a geological feature in the Canajoharie Creek. The meaning of the name is “the pot that washes itself.” By 1829 the village was incorporated and thrived as a market town on the Erie Canal.

In 1882 with the extension of the railroad through the Village, manufacturing and limestone quarrying was stimulated; there is still manufacturing here today although on a greatly reduced scale.

In recent years, these communities have welcomed many Amish families and a return of traditional Mohawk people to their ancestral lands. Beech-Nut, the baby food producer, was founded in Canajoharie in 1891 and served as the largest employer in the town for over a century.

With a combined 2000 census of fewer than 4000 people, there is a small town quality of life that results in participation in local activities and a working together to make our villages a better place to raise and educate children. We invite you to visit at any season. Take time to listen to the sounds, study the local history, view our world class collection of American art at the Arkell Museum, enjoy a picnic by the river or take a walk in Wintergreen Park.

OTSEGO COUNTY

Reprinted from the American History and General Project

Otsego County was taken from Montgomery in 1791. It is centrally distant from New York City, 200 miles, and from Albany, 66 miles. Its form is very irregular. The greatest length north and south is about 40 miles, and the greatest length east and west is 35 miles. This county is considerably elevated, though there are no distinct ranges of mountains of much height. A larger portion of the soil of the county is rich and productive. A large amount of capital is invested in agriculture and manufactures. The Susquehanna River, rising in the Otsego Lake, flows southerly to the bounds of the county; then turning southwesterly, forms a part of the southern boundary. The Unadilla bounds the county on the west. Otsego Lake, 9 miles long and from 1 to 3 wide, and Canadarago Lake, 5 miles long and from 1 to 2 wide, are beautiful sheets of water. The hills which encompass Otsego Lake, have an elevation of from 400 to 500 feet above its surface. The purity of its waters, and the rich and varied scenery about it, render it attractive to the lovers of natural scenery. Portions of this county were settled as early as 1739. The mass of the settlers were emigrants from the eastern states. The county is divided into 22 towns. (Historical Collections of the State of New York, Past and Present, John Barber, Clark Albien & Co. 1851)

- Otsego County is situated on the highlands at the headwaters of the Susquehanna River to the southeast of the center of the State. Its surface presents a great variety of hills, fertile valleys, hurrying streams and lovely lakes. Of the latter, Otsego is not only the largest, being eight miles long, but one known to a nation through the Leatherstocking tales of James Fenimore Cooper. The whole county is full of interest, historical and fictional; its highland beauty and salubrious climate can be enjoyed in half a hundred summer resorts. Dairying has been brought to a perfection not found often; and the multiplication of railroads and, in more recent years, of hard surfaced highways has made it accessible to all.

Three years after Henry Hudson came to Albany, eight years before the Pilgrim Fathers landed at Plymouth, two Dutch explorers came up the Mohawk from Albany, crossed the hills to Lake Otsego, and went down the valley of the Susquehanna. They were the first white men to

visit this region. They filed a map of their travels at Amsterdam, Hoiland, where it was found only a few years ago. There may have been, must have been, travelers and traders who came into this country in the years before any attempt was made at settlement. But it was not until 1769 that surveyors came to establish lines of the grants made by the State to individuals. In 1768 such a grant had been made by George Clark, Lieutenant-Governor of the State, to John Lindsay, Jacob Roseboom, Lenelet Gansevoort, and Sybrant vanSchaick. This was at Cherry Valley, where the first of the pioneers of the county had located in 1739. As late as 1762 there were only 12 families in this settlement, but at the beginning of the Revolution, the number of settlers had risen to 300. In November, 1776, this Cherry Valley settlement was attacked by the Indians, causing the death of 48, and in 1780 a second massacre made the few remaining inhabitants flee, leaving the place deserted until after the end of the war.

These and other Indian attacks led to a punitive expedition by Sullivan in 1779. General Clinton, with 1,800 men, was to join him with the troops he had brought to Otsego Lake. Desiring to descend the Susquehanna in boats, and finding the river too low to be navigated, he dammed the lake, arranging his boats along the shores.

When the lake had risen three feet, he tore out the dam and, on the escaping flood, sailed directly into the Indian country. The Indians, astonished at the sudden lowering of the river, and even more amazed by its sudden rise, upon whose crest came the white man's fleet, regarded it as a sign that the Great Spirit had gone to the aid of the enemy, and fled precipitately before the forces of the invader. The county, with its dozen remaining families in 1776, was a deserted wilderness within the next year or two.

The disasters, and the coming of the soldiery to avenge the disasters, proved to be a blessing in the end, for by these events was the country brought to the attention of hundreds to whom it was a terra incognita. Not only did the pioneers of the area return to their former homes, but they were joined by some of the thousands of the New Englanders and others who joined the great hegira that started shortly after the close of the Revolution.

By 1791 the region felt that it should have a separate government from Montgomery County and a more convenient place to which it might go on the county's business. In 1791 the county of

Otsego was set up and Cooperstown, on Lake Otsego, was named as the shire village. Only two towns were organized at that time; Otsego, lying

to the west of the lake and the Susquehanna, and Cherry Valley as the remaining section. Before the end of the century eleven more civil divisions had been made, and during the next 54 years the number was brought up to 24.



The Old Stone Fort Museum Complex

Located in the village of Schoharie, the Old Stone Fort Museum Complex celebrates Schoharie County's rich history. Explore the site's historic buildings including the iconic Old Stone Fort built in 1772 as a High Dutch (German) Reformed Church. Fortified in 1777 and attacked by British forces in 1780 during the American Revolution, visitors can still see the scar left by a British 3-pound cannon ball during that assault.



The Schoharie County Historical Society has been operating the Fort as a museum for more than 130 years. The Society has a collection of more



than 50,000 artifacts related to the history of Schoharie County; maintains a research library and a local genealogy collection; publishes a semi-annual local history magazine; and offers a wide range of educational and recreational activities. HISTORIC CHERRY VALLEY

Cherry Valley is one of those timeless places filled with a history that one can feel once you enter into its embrace.

Established in 1740 by John Lindsay, the area became known as Cherry Valley, because of the number of wild cherry trees growing here. The furthest outpost of known civilization during the times leading up to the

American Revolution, we became famous on November 11, 1778 as the site of the Cherry Valley Massacre. This event left its mark in the annals of American History when a raiding party of Tories, Mohawk and Seneca Indians and Butler's Rangers left the tiny settlement in ruins with many innocent men, women and children dead or captured. The tiny settlement re-emerged in the

1790's as a vibrant and thriving community at the terminus of the Great Western Turnpike, Route 20, that eventually would stretch from Boston to Oregon.

A long history as an artist and writer's community, which includes Willa Cather, Poet Allen Ginsberg and many of the major personalities of the Beat scene, plus musicians, artists and film makers are one of Cherry Valley's many hallmarks. The transgender actress and Andy Warhol Superstar Candy Darling is buried in the historic Cherry Valley Cemetery as well as many earlier pioneers and personalities that have

made their mark on American politics and society.

The Cherry Valley Village Historic District is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as well as the New York State Historic Register and the Town of Cherry Valley is listed in the New York State Historic

Landscape Register. The Cherry Valley Museum has an extensive collection of artifacts from the early Woodland Period through the American Revolution and Turnpike era and exhibits of early clothing and implements. It even has two ghosts!

We are a place of old fashioned church suppers, an annual Memorial Day Parade, one of the liveliest kite festivals in the country as well as a Sculpture Trail and we are the summer home to many of the personalities associated with the Glimmerglass Opera Festival. Incredible fine dining, quaint shops and 'Homes with History' round out a visitors experience.

We are minutes from Cooperstown and many of the historic monuments, homes and battlefields in the Mohawk Valley.

Hartwick, NY

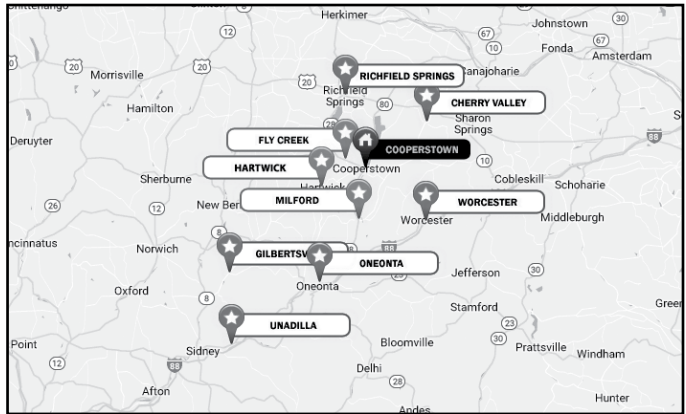
This rural 2,203 person town is home to the Cooperstown Bat Company and the scenic Hartwick Highlands Campground.

SCHOHARIE COUNTY

Discover the Way Life Used to Be

SCHOHARIE COUNTY – SIMPLER TIMES REFLECTED IN ITS TOWNS AND VILLAGES

A visit to Upstate New York's Schoharie County is a trip to quaint towns and villages, filled with reminders of simpler times and exciting new ideas. Simpler times made new.

Farmers work their land. Brooks babble. Eagles fly. Fish jump in the streams. Unique attractions – grand caves, acres of flowers, long uninterrupted hiking trails and more – all are part of Schoharie County's magic. Specialty shops and farm to table restaurants compliment the surroundings as do the local farm stands full of bounty of the land waiting to be enjoyed.

Find out why we say Schoharie County is picture-perfect any time of year.

Blenheim, which takes its name from the 40,000-acre Blenheim Patent given to 40 men by King George III in 1769, has farming as its chief occupation. In earlier times, farmers here grew wheat, hops, broomcorn and tobacco. Today the land yields primarily timothy, alfalfa and silage corn. It is home to the Blenheim-Gilboa Pumped Storage Power Project of the New York Power Authority, which has a Visitors Center offering exhibits on energy and electricity. Also, on the site is the newly restored and refurbished 19th century country estate, Lansing Manor. Not far away is Mine Kill State Park with boating, fishing, picnicking, swimming and a waterfall overlook. One of the most prominent attractions in town is the 226-foot Blenheim Covered Bridge. Originally built in 1855 and lost in Tropical Storm Irene in 2011, this magnificent bridge was rebuilt with remarkable accuracy and continues to lure visitors like the original.

Broome, originally established in 1797 as Bristol, is home to the Franklinton Vlaie (pond), located along Route 145. It is a scenic recreational, ecological and natural wonder. Bald Eagles often are seen perched along the waterways in the town.

Cobleskill, with the village established in 1752, is named for one of its first settlers Jacob Kobel, a German Palatine who came with his family to the region in 1713. One of the six original towns in the county, it is home to two caves that are open to the public – Howe Caverns and Secret Caverns – as well as the Iroquois Indian Museum and the State University of New York College of Agriculture and Technology also known as SUNY Cobleskill and much more. Each August since 1876, the Schoharie County Sunshine Fair has been held at the historic fairgrounds on the edge of the village.

The town lines of Conesville follow the peaks that mark the beginning of the Catskill Mountains. One of the most spectacular attractions in town is Manorkill Falls,

just west of West Conesville. The Manorkill Creek flows through the valley, dropping into the Schoharie Reservoir in a breathtaking cascade of waterfalls. The cold mountain waters in the streams are ideal for trout fishing.

Just west of Schenectady is Esperance, established in 1846. The Esperance Historical Museum, housed in the old village schoolhouse and its adjacent carriage barn, tells about the town's agricultural past. Famous sons include George Westinghouse, Jr., who was born in the Village of Central Bridge in 1846; whose father made parts for carriages and farm equipment in his shop there. After briefly attending Union College in Schenectady and serving during the Civil War, George Jr. became an inventor and an industrialist. His most famous invention is the air brake, which led to the formation of the Westinghouse Air Brake Company and the Westinghouse Electric Corporation. Today, Esperance is home to the 200-plus-acre public garden in the Landis Arboretum, which offers nature walks among rare trees and plants and special programs throughout the year.

Fulton, the largest town (in acreage) in Schoharie County, was formed in 1828. Dominating the skyline in the central part of the county is Vroman's Nose, rising about 600-feet above the farmlands. Vroman's Nose resulted from glacial action more than 50,000 years ago. It is located on the Long Path, a 335-mile hiking trail that runs from the George Washington Bridge in New York City to Thatcher Park in Albany County. The Max V. Shaul State Park is located along Route 30 at the base of Toe Path Mountain, offering visitors a variety of outdoor activities including hiking, picnicking and camping. Looking Glass Pond, with its freshly stocked bass, is a favorite among anglers and outdoor enthusiasts. Art and artists can be found in the eclectic setting of the Panther Creek Arts.

SCHOHARIE COUNTY

A unique outdoor, educational display of nine fossilized trees, dating back 370 million years, is in Gilboa near the Town Hall, a half mile from the overlook at the Gilboa Dam. The trees were part of the Gilboa Forest, located on the shores of a tropical ocean in the Devonian Period. Also stop by the Gilboa Museum and Juried History Center for an in-depth look at the history of the fossils and the story of Gilboa Reservoir which is a primary water source for New York City.

Jefferson, named after the third president of the United States, contains 24,930 acres. It is home to Woodchuck Hill, the apex of the watersheds for the Delaware, Susquehanna and Hudson rivers. The village of Jefferson features a wonderful village green as well as the Maple Museum.

Middleburgh, first formed in 1797, takes its name from the location of the Middle Fort, one of the Schoharie Valley's three fortifications from the American Revolution. The town offers some of the county's most fertile farmland and is home to the Dr. Best House and Museum, offering visitors a rare glimpse into a 19th century medical practice. Main Street is a delight to see and experience the shops, excellent restaurants and craft beverages.

German Palatines first settled the Town of Schoharie in 1713. About a mile north of the village center is The Old Stone Fort Museum Complex, earlier known as the Lower Fort, and one of the three forts in the Schoharie Valley during the American Revolution. In addition to the Old Stone Fort, Schoharie has historic sites as the 1743 Palatine House and the Court House on Main Street which was built in 1870. It is also home to the Schoharie County Railroad Museum that holds treasures from the days when trains crossed the valleys to deliver dairy products, food goods and workers and much more to the Albany area and beyond.

Seward was first settled in 1754 by Palatines –

immigrants from Dorlach, Germany – who called it the community New Dorlach. In 1840, the present Town of Seward was formed and named in honor of William H. Seward, then Governor of New York State. During the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the Hamlet of Dorloo was known for the Seward Valley Race Track that featured horse racing on a half-mile track.

In the mid-19th century, Sharon Springs was famous the world over for its restorative mineral springs. The signs of a bygone area are found today in architectural gems -- farmhouses and hotels pre-dating the American Revolution through the turn of the century – retaining the spirit of the early pioneers and Victorian high society.

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Village of Sharon Springs is home to walking tours, antique shops, the Sharon Historical Museum and Schoolhouse, the restored historic Roseboro and American hotels and more. In 2009 Josh Kilmer-Purcell and Dr. Brent Ridge bought the mansion once owned by the Honorable William Beekman circa 1802 and began the exciting lifestyle brand named Beekman 1802.

The Town of Summit, first established in 1794, is home to the 60-acre, spring-fed Summit Lake. The town, with its diverse terrain, is a four-season playground with hunting, fishing, snowmobiling and cross-country skiing. In Charlotteville, the Museum of the History of Charlotteville/Anonymous Arts Museum can be found on Main Street, County Route 6.

In the early 1700s, Palatine Germans settled the Town of Wright, named after New York State Governor Silas Wright. The most popular annual event in Gallupville is Gas Up, which takes place on the second and third weekends of June. The show offers demonstrations of antique gasoline engines as well as antique trucks, tractors, equipment and autos.

SCHOHARIE COLONIAL HERITAGE ASSOCIATION

History: One of our first projects was the restoration of the oldest existing buildings in Schoharie, the 1743 Palatine House. Also known as the Old Lutheran Parsonage, the Palatine House is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and was one of the few frame buildings spared when Brandt raided Schoharie during the Revolutionary War and burned the village to the ground. The Association has also acquired and restored abandoned buildings on Depot Lane in Schoharie. The buildings had not been in use since the demise of the Middleburgh and Schoharie Railroads. For several years now SCHA volunteers, with the aid of New York State Department of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation and O'Connor Foundation Grants, have worked to develop the Station House, Freight Shed, Engine House, Weigh Station and the Old Mill Building into a historical complex - The Schoharie Valley Railroads Museum.

ATTRACTIONS

PARKS & RECREATIONS

Gilbert Lake, Laurens, Otsego County. This 1600-acre park offers a huge variety of summer fun. Boat rentals, hiking trails, fishing, swimming, horseshoe pits, basketball and volley ball courts, playground and playing fields, and a frisbee-disc golf course await visitors. The park has a thirty-eight acre lake, three ponds, streams and marshes, and wooded hills. Camping available.

Glimmerglass State Park, Otsego County. Five hundred ninety-three acres of park lands border the fabled lake of James Fennimore Cooper's Leatherstocking Tales. Fishing, biking, hiking, swimming nature trails and a huge sand beach await visitors to Glimmerglass. Anglers may cast a line for Lake Trout, Coho Salmon, Largemouth Bass, Smallmouth Bass, Brown Trout, Brown Bullheads, Yellow Perch or Chain Pickerel. The park includes many picnic areas with tables, a beaver pond, nature trails and a covered bridge. Also on the grounds is Hyde Hall, the estate of George Hyde Clarke. Camping available.

Herkimer Home, Little Falls, Herkimer County. The home of General Nicholas Herkimer, a Revolutionary War hero, is open to the public. Situated on the Mohawk River near the portage at Little Falls, the house has been restored and is furnished with period pieces. A Kitchen Garden is authentic to the revolutionary period and includes culinaries, medicinals, dye plants and produce. Costumed staff and volunteers do the work of the household and the farm on Sunday afternoons. The house is open Wed. – Sat. 10-5, Sunday 1-5.

Hunt's Pond State Park, New Berlin, Chenango County. Near historic Norwich, the park offers primitive camping, fishing, and nature observation. There is a boat launch (no motors), hiking, picnic areas with fireplaces, and a fifty-acre lake. Camping available.

Oquaga Creek State Park, Bainbridge, Delaware County. This state park is a 1500-acre window on nature. Hikers may hope to see white-tailed deer, cottontail rabbit, beaver, woodchuck, gray squirrel, black bear, coyote and red fox. The bird population includes Pileated Woodpecker, Blue Heron, Rosebreasted Grosbeak, Baltimore Oriole, Eastern Bluebird and various warblers. The lake has a sand beach. There is a playground, Frisbee-Disc Golf Course, and picnic areas with tables and fireplaces. Camping available.

The Cooperstown Art Association has a regular schedule of exhibitions at The Cooperstown Library. Exhibits change monthly. On Labor Day weekend Saturday and Sunday, they celebrate Fine Arts on The Lawn, a show and sale.

The Cooperstown Chamber Music Festival concert season begins Wednesday, June 19, and ends Sunday,

October 2. Concerts are held in several different venues. Tickets for the evening concerts are \$25 for adults, \$15 for student children 6-18. Five - and eight-concert subscriptions, as well as early bird discounts, are available. THE ARTS

The Earlville Opera House offers a summer season of music, theater, and cultural events. The opera house is a refurbished theater that first opened its doors in 1893. Citizens have restored the building. From May to mid-September, it is the locale for art exhibits, dramatic performances and concerts from classical to Cajun.

The Leatherstocking Theatre company offers a few productions each summer season at their theater on Route 80, opposite Glimmerglass Opera.

The Orpheus Theater at the State University College Oneonta campus features musical productions.

The Yager Museum at Hartwick College in Oneonta has over 17,000 artifacts divided into four main categories: archaeological, ethnographic, fine arts, and historical. The Fine Arts collection contains 1,000 works dating from the 16th to the 20th centuries and consists of paintings, drawings, prints, icons, and sculpture. The collection is primarily American but also has items from Europe, Russia, and Asia.

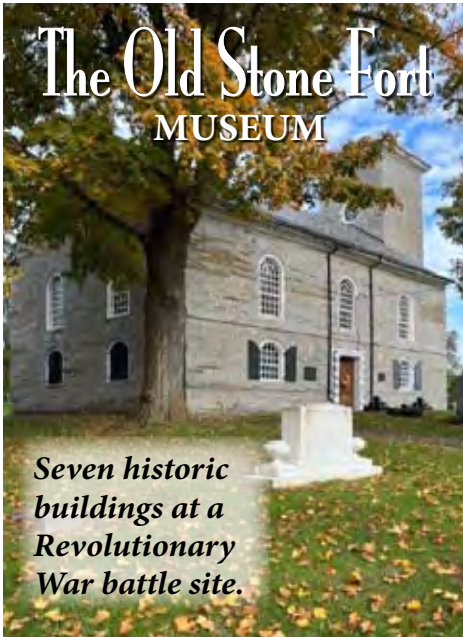
