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

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Away from the city's noise and set in the western slopes of the Catskill Mountains is a land of wooded hills and fertile green valleys, of over 700 miles of fishing streams, of covered bridges, welcoming people and beautiful vistas. This is Delaware County, Mother Nature's home in New York's Catskill Mountains.

Our rural heritage is celebrated everyday at country fairs, farm days and festivals, serving residents, recent and long-time, a genuine slice of rural life. Neighbors share a smile and a story over a cup of coffee at the local diner or on a front porch.

Each community offers diverse and reasonably priced housing in neighborhoods that are among the safest in New York State. Innovative educational resources and comprehensive health care facilities are available throughout the county.

With thousands of acres of public land and a wide variety of game habitats, Delaware County is a sportsman's paradise. Whether your enthusiasm is fly-fishing, bass fishing or hunting, Delaware County has what you're after. American fly-fishing was born in the Catskills. The West Branch and East Branch of the Delaware River are two of the area's premier trout streams and the Pepacton and Cannonsville Reservoirs of the New York City water supply are among bass and trout fishing's best-kept secrets. If hunting is your sport, Delaware County offers the best game around: bear, deer, turkey, squirrel, rabbits, game birds and everything in between.

Recreational opportunities abound at our parks, hiking and biking trails, wildlife preserves, public pools, horse trails, soccer fields and baseball diamonds. Team sports keep community playing fields filled with players and their fans cheering them on all season long.

Geographically one of the larger counties in New York State, Delaware County covers 1,460 square miles, an area larger than that of Rhode Island. It ranges from valley bottoms of 1000 feet above sea level to peaks higher than 3000 feet. Both branches of the Delaware River rise in the northeast corner-the West Branch in Lake Utsayantha, Stamford, and the East Branch in Grand Gorge-and traverse the County before joining forces in Hancock.

It was the Delaware River that first attracted early settlers to this unique area. A party of eleven Dutchmen from Hurley, near Kingston, explored the Margaretville area as early as 1762. They returned and negotiated with Chancellor Livingston to buy land in what is now Middletown for twenty shillings an acre. Early in 1763 they moved their families there. Others soon joined them to form the commu-

nity of Pakatakan.

By the start of the American Revolution, white settlements were beginning to populate what is now Delaware County. Carrying new colonizers to Delaware and even on to what was then the wild frontier of western New York State was the Catskill Turnpike, the first through route from the Hudson to the West

The particularly vicious nature of the war waged by the infamous alliance of Joseph Brant's Mohawks and the Tories during the American Revolution all but decimated the Delaware area. After the war, however, new settlers flocked to the region and by 1794 the residents, then belonging to Ulster and Otsego counties, began agitating for separation. In 1797 the New York State Legislature formally set the area apart as Delaware County.

Lumbering and stone cutting were the first major industries in the county. The trees stood tall and straight and were highly prized by shipbuilders. The mainmast of the famous USS Constitution came from a hilltop near Walton.

Agriculture came to replace these industries in prominence and Delaware County became internationally known for the high quality of its dairy products.

It was here in Delaware County in the 1840's that the final episodes of the "Anti-Rent War" took place, bringing an end to a feudal tenant system and leading directly to the passage of the National Homestead Act.

Delaware County also became a rural retreat for urban tourists from New York City as railroads brought guests to local boarding houses. Vacation resorts began to develop as clean air, fresh food and beautiful vistas lured city dwellers. The visitors and artists who traveled throughout the Catskills introduced urban tastes and culture and began a phenomenon that blended long-standing practices and assimilated styles, which continues today.

Our history is filled with stories of individual heroism and community accomplishments. Such events as bring-a-dish suppers, barn raisings and town hall meetings are all reminiscent of those customs believed to be forgotten years ago. Yet, these are everyday occurrences in Delaware County.

Our home is a special place. Beautiful vistas, welcoming people, innovative educational resources, varied cultural amenities, safe communities and a commitment to economic growth and development all within a few hours drive from major metropolitan centers make Delaware County an ideal place in which to live and work.

The Herkimer County area offers an inexhaustible number of leisure time activities. Whether indoor or outdoor, the opportunities for entertainment are practically endless. In addition to the many attractions found just minutes from home, residents are within an hour or two of every other region of the state except Long Island.

Golf

There are over 40 golf courses, public and private in the Herkimer County area. There are both 9- and 18 - hole courses, and half of them are par 70 or better courses. More than 6 driving ranges, one of them indoors, and around 15 miniature golf courses dot the landscape.

Hunting/Hiking

Part of the lure of Herkimer County is the ability to get out in the woods and back to nature. Miles and miles of trails crisscross the county and offer the hiker a wide variety of terrain and scenery to satisfy even the most discerning enthusiast. Hunting and trapping are a part of the history of our area. Native Americans and our early settlers began this proud tradition. Hunters are, of course, aware that this area was the home of Eliphalet Remington whose name still appears on guns formerly made in Herkimer County. Deer, bear, rabbit, fox, beaver, wild turkey, pheasant and grouse all provide the hunter and trapper a challenge.

Winter Sports

Cross country skiing, downhill skiing, snowmobiling, snowboarding and snowshoeing are all a part of winter in Herkimer County. There are literally hundreds of miles of groomed and maintained snowmobile trails as well as miles of both groomed and make-your-own trails for cross country skiing. McCauley Mountain in Old Forge offers a challenge as well as panoramic scenery for the downhill skier. There are also trails open for three and

four wheel vehicles. There are many winter vehicle sales and service outlets throughout the County

Water Parks

The Enchanted Forest — Water Safari is an amusement park/water park. It is the largest water park in New York and is located within Old Forge, in the Adirondack region. With 31 heated water slides and rides, it has been rated the number four waterpark in the US.

Fishing/Boating

Lakes and streams abound in the County. The Fulton Chain of Lakes is a pleasure boat paradise with over 12 miles of continuous lake travel. The Erie Canal also offers boaters a unique journey back to old canal days. Canoeing, kayaking and rafting are also part of the many water sports. Fishing has a long history here. Lakes, streams, and rivers abounds with native fish. The West Canada Creek is considered by many to be one of the best trout fishing streams in NY State. Brook and lake trout, bullheads, whitefish, large and small bass, perch and sun fish are plentiful in our streams and rivers.

Munson Williams Proctor Arts Institute in Utica. Students and visitors alike are afforded the opportunity to both appreciate and create works of art through its Museum, School of Art and Performing Arts Division. The museum is home to a variety of American and European art, including Pablo Picasso and Thomas Cole. Located next door to the MWP, is Fountain Elms, the Victorian ancestral home of the institute's founders.

The MWP's Great Artist Series brings the world's greatest performers to the stage of the magnificently restored Stanley Performing Arts Center.

In addition...

For other musical tastes, there is the Chamber Music Society of Utica, the Mohawk Valley Choral Society, and the Glimmerglass Opera House in Cooperstown. Lighter musical fare can be enjoyed at venues such as the Kirkland Arts Center Coffeehouse, the Mohawk Valley Center

for the Arts in Little Falls and the Adirondack Bank Center, which regularly features some of the biggest names in pop, country and rock music. Jazz enthusiasts frequent Tiny's in Utica for legends like Maynard Ferguson and Chuck Mangione, who lives just a few hours away near Rochester. The Players of Utica, one of the oldest community theatre groups in the country, regularly present productions as does the Ilion Theatre Club.

Transportation Highways

Herkimer County's industrial corridor is served by the New York State Thruway (1-90) in an East-West direction. Access to the Thruway which allows tandem trailer traffic, is available at exits 29A in Little Falls, 30 in Herkimer and exit 31 in nearby Utica.

CENTRAL ADIRONDACKS

The Town of Webb is the largest township of New York State, in the heart of the Central Adirondacks and encompasses six North Country hamlets - Beaver River, Big Moose, Eagle Bay, Old Forge, Stillwater and Thendara. The Town of Webb surrounds the first four lakes of the Fulton Chain of Lakes (explored by Robert Fulton as a possible canal route, and named in his honor), as well as Big Moose Lake and Stillwater Reservoir, and a multitude of smaller lakes and ponds. During the early development of the Adirondacks, Old Forge was, and remains so today, the main western entry point into the Adirondacks, and offers vacationers a cornucopia of exciting activities for every age and interest. During the summer, Old Forge and its sister hamlets offer all the water sport opportunities you could wish for - swimming, power boating and waterskiing, sailing, canoeing or kayaking, and fishing for Lake, Brook, Brown or Rainbow Trout, Tiger Muskie, Small and Large-Mouth Bass, landlocked Salmon and various Panfish.

Campers can hook up their RV's or pitch their tents at the Old Forge Camping Resort, Singing Waters Campground or Nicks Lake State Campsite. Or, for a true Adirondack wilderness camping experience, reserve a lean-to site on Alger Island, accessible only by water. Hikers will enjoy numerous trails, including the ever popular and easy 40-minute trek to the top of Rondaxe Mountain (aka Bald Mountain), with its firetower and panoramic views of the Fulton Chain. Or take the scenic chairlift ride up McCauley Mountain – a spectacular vantage point to take in the wondrous fall foliage of the Central Adirondacks.

In the winter, McCauley Mountain's chairlift services 21 downhill skiing trails and glades, and offers miles of groomed cross-country trails. Snowshoeing is also a wonderful way to explore the snow covered landscape. Old Forge, known as the "Snowmobile Capital of the East," offers hundreds of

miles of well-maintained and groomed snowmobile trails, attracting snowmobilers from all over the country. Recently the snowmobile trails have been opened in the summer to hikers and mountain bikers, allowing visitors an opportunity to enjoy the beauty of the Adirondacks while testing their skills on unique and diverse terrain.

When you're not exploring the Adirondack wilderness, Old Forge will entice and entertain you with a multitude of events, attractions and activities. You'll find thrills and fun at the Enchanted Forest/Water Safari, with 31 heated water slides and rides. Enjoy mountain and water panoramas on Old Forge Lake Cruises, or you can board the Adirondack Scenic Railroad at Thendara Station and enjoy pristine woodland views rolling by your window and cross the old trestle bridge over the Moose River.

You can get into the swing of things with 18 of the most picturesque holes of golf at the Thendara Golf Course. Meanwhile View, the Arts Center in Old Forge, continues a 50-year tradition of arts in the Adirondacks, offering numerous exhibits, including the nationally recognized Annual Adirondacks National Exhibition of American Watercolors. Try visiting Old Forge's History Corner, the Goodsell Museum, where the Town of Webb's history lives offering free admission year round. And if that's not enough, there always seems to be a community-sponsored event going... Antique Wooden Boat Show, Polkafest or Snodeo, to name a few.

The Town of Webb has a wide variety of restaurant options – from family to fine dining, quality accommodations – from deluxe inns and hotels to affordable motor inns and cottages. Main Street (Route 28) is a shopper's delight, offering a multitude of specialty shops, including the ever-popular Old Forge Hardware Store.

FULTON/MONTGOMERY COUNTY

About Our Community

Montgomery County, first named as Tryon County in 1772, originally had its boundaries extending as far north as the St. Lawrence River, as far south as the Pennsylvania border, and as far west as the territories of the Six Nations. The name was changed to Montgomery in 1784 in honor of General Richard Montgomery, Revolutionary War hero.

The county has an area of 409 square miles measuring 15-16 miles North to South and 43 miles East to West. Montgomery County is made up of ten villages, one city (Amsterdam), and 10 towns, with a total US Census 2000 population of 49,708. History of Canajoharie/Palatine Bridge

Early settlers from the Palatinate area of Germany began settling on the north side of the Mohawk River in 1723. The original population of Mohawk Indians was mostly driven out of the area during the American Revolution. At the construction of the bridge in 1798 spanning the Mohawk River the community received its combined name of Palatine Bridge. Incorporation as a village occurred in 1867.

The small settlement on the south side of the river was known as "Roof's Village". After the Revolution, this settlement was renamed Canajoharie (its original Iroquois

name) which referred to a geological feature in the Canajoharie Creek. The meaning of the name is "the pot that washes itself." By 1829 the village was incorporated and thrived as a market town on the Erie Canal.

In 1882 with the extension of the railroad through the Village, manufacturing and limestone quarrying was stimulated; there is still manufacturing here today although on a greatly reduced scale.

In recent years, these communities have welcomed many Amish families and a return of traditional Mohawk people to their ancestral lands. Beech-Nut, the baby food producer, was founded in Canajoharie in 1891 and served as the largest employer in the town for over a century.



With a combined 2000 census of fewer than 4000 people, there is a small town quality of life that results in participation in local activities and a working together to make our villages a better place to raise and educate children. We invite you to visit at any season. Take time to listen to the sounds, study the local history, view our world class collection of American art at the Arkell Museum, enjoy a picnic by the river or take a walk in Wintergreen Park.

As you cruise down Route 20 into Otsego County, you will feel compelled to give a standing ovation for culture, adventure, and history. Around here, the past isn't just dusted off and remembered; it's slapped into your hands by musicians, artists, and historians who scoff at the very idea of dusty display cases. This isn't your grandma's history lesson—prepare to be schooled in the most entertaining way possible.

Richfield Springs packs a historical punch with three National Historic Districts and a past steeped in 19th-century resort glamor, thanks to its mineral springs. Swing by **Spring Park** to sip on the locally famous, supposedly therapeutic sulfur water. Don't miss the quaint bandstand and, if you're in town on a Wednesday night, catch a summer concert at the park pavilion. It's a throwback experience with a side of healing hydration.

Canadarago Lake, nestled just south of the village, is a fisherman's delight as the second-largest lake in the Susquehanna watershed. Launch your boat at Canadarago State Marine Park or soak up some sun at Baker's Beach, both conveniently located off Rt. 28 on the lake's western shore. It's the perfect spot for those who love their water with a slice of wilderness.

Take the scenic East Lake Road (Route 22) towards Cooperstown and you'll discover **The Lake House Restaurant & Lodge.** Built in 1843, this charming spot offers stunning lakeside views and live music during the summer months. It's a delightful mix of historical ambiance and modern entertainment, right on the shores of Canadarago Lake.

Once you hit Cooperstown, take a swing at **Doubleday Field**—the so-called cradle of baseball—if legends are to be believed. And just a stone's throw away, the **National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum** throws a perfect game of nostalgia, saluting the titans of the diamond. This isn't just a trip down memory lane; it's more like a home run trot through history.

Bottle & Barrels: Otsego County is truly a paradise for craft beverage enthusiasts! Our local scene bubbles over with everything from tart ciders to bold brews, nestled in scenic settings that make each sip a part of the landscape.

Cider and Wine Lovers Rejoice: Fly Creek is the apple of our eye. At the Fly Creek Cider Mill, the cider magic is palpable. Step into their welcoming tasting room, where you can sample a delightful array of hard ciders, apple wines, and more. Just a stone's throw away, you'll find Pail Shop Vineyards, where each bottle of wine is a masterpiece, influenced by local art and the vibrant community. Nearby, Montezuma Winery in Cooperstown adds to the local flavor with a wide selection of wines that capture the essence of the region.

Further down the road in New Berlin, Uncommon Kin Cidery offers up unique, handcrafted ciders that challenge and delight the palate with unconventional blends.

Cherry Valley & Beyond: Red Shed Brewery stretches its branches with three locations: one in Cooperstown and two in Cherry Valley, each offering distinct vibes and brews that reflect their unique settings. Whether you're enjoying a sunny afternoon or a cozy evening, Red Shed's welcoming atmosphere and diverse lineup ensure a memorable visit.

Burlington Flats Brews & Vines: Venture to Burlington Flats, where Rustic Ridge Winery and High Burl Brewery share a picturesque property. Rustic Ridge pours a variety of wines that capture the essence of the region, while High Burl crafts beers that are as robust and hearty as the surrounding woods.

Beer Enthusiasts' Corner: Just across route 33 from Red Shed, sits the OG Brewer, Ommegang. They brew up the charm and Belgian-style beers on a picturesque 135-acre spread that was once a hops farm, and historically known as Nova Belgium. Nearby, Butternuts Beer & Ale in Garrattsville serves up quirky and delightful brews, while Muddy River Farm Brewery in Oneonta crafts beers infused with locally sourced, farm-fresh ingredients. Not to be outdone, Cooperstown Brewing Company in Milford delights fans with its baseball-themed beers.

Spirit of Cooperstown: No tour of Otsego's beverages would be complete without a stop at Cooperstown Distillery. This artisanal spot distills spirits that capture the heart of the region, from smooth whiskeys to vibrant gins, each bottle is a tribute to local craftsmanship.

Take a detour from the Byway down Route 80 from Springfield Center for an enchanting journey to Cooperstown, where the shimmering waters of Otsego Lake, fondly nicknamed "Glimmerglass" by James Fenimore Cooper, mirror a route rich with history and culture. First up, tee off at **Otsego Golf Club**, one of America's oldest links, established in 1894. It's a perfect warm-up for Cooperstown, where, let's be honest, golf might just be the runner-up to baseball as the town's favorite pastime.

Next, glide to the **Glimmerglass Festival**, a summer spectacle of world-class opera and musicals that light up the lakeside with dramatic flair every July and August. On your way, don't miss the **Fenimore Art Museum**, a treasure trove of American folk, fine art, and the revered Thaw Collection of American Indian Art.

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

As you swing further down the lakeside, drop by the **Leatherstocking Golf Course** for a second round in a setting that's as picturesque as it is challenging. It's not every day you get to say you've played America's pastime and its second favorite all in one go!

Just a chip shot away, **The Farmers' Museum** offers a back-in-time experience with its 18th-century docents and friendly farm animals. It's like a living history book, only way more fun. As you near Cooperstown's heart, the stately **Otesaga Resort Hotel** ushers you into a town brimming with baseball legends, quaint shops, and inviting eateries.

For a slice of modern adventure, pedal the **Rail Explorers** in Milford. These pedal-assist rail bikes add a zippy twist to exploring the great outdoors. After fully indulging in Cooperstown's charms, circle back to Route 20 via Route 31, making a pit stop at **Hyde Hall** in Glimmerglass State Park, home to the oldest wooden covered bridge in the U.S.

Finish your grand tour by reconnecting with Route 20 with a detour through historic Cherry Valley. This isn't just a trip—it's a grand slam of scenic views, historic sites, and, yes, a double helping of golf!

This historic village was once a bustling gateway to the American Frontier via Route 20. It's steeped in history, from the Cherry Valley Massacre during the Revolutionary War to being the birthplace of Samuel F.B. Morse's telegraph in 1837, celebrated at **The Cherry Valley Bookstore**.

Today, Cherry Valley is experiencing a vibrant renaissance with new retail spots, restaurants, and stores. Make sure to visit the **Red Shed Ale House**, a local favorite pouring craft brews with village charm. Also, stop by **The Cherry Valley Museum** for a glimpse into 1800s fashion and pick up a map for a historical walking tour featuring early architecture and monuments.

For dining, **The Rose and Kettle** offers a fine experience, or enjoy a picnic among the **Cherry Valley Lilacs**. Conclude your visit as you return to Route 20 via Main Street, enriched by the village's rich past and its lively present.

As you journey back on the scenic byway, don't miss the iconic TeePee welcomes travelers heading toward Schoharie County—a quirky landmark filled with Minnetonka Moccasins, fine Native Americanmade items, drums, flutes, music and books, there is also a selection of products made in the USA as well as locally.

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


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
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1790's as a vibrant and thriving community at the terminus of the Great Western Turnpike, Route 20, that eventually would stretch from Boston to Oregon.

SCHOHARIE COUNTY – SIMPLER TIMES REFLECTED IN ITS TOWNS AND VILLAGES

Heading east again on Route 20, you find yourself officially in Schoharie County, a treasure trove of adventures that travelers can't help but describe as "picture-perfect." Get ready for a panorama of lush, rolling pastures ready to dazzle your eyes and fill up your photo storage. But the scenic beauty is just the appetizer: Schoharie is home to subterranean marvels and lush agricultural wonders.

Historic Sharon Springs Head straight into the heart of Sharon Springs, just a short spin east on Route 20 and a northward nudge on Route 10. Here, in this charming village, history meets hip in the most delightful way. Once the go-to retreat for those seeking the rejuvenating touch of its mineral springs, this quaint village now brims with a vibrant Main Street, where every storefront whispers tales of revival and renaissance.

Step into the elegantly restored 1847 American Hotel, a beacon of the community's charm. Next, swing by Beekman 1802 Kindness Shop—a former goat soap start-up turned global lifestyle juggernaut, thanks to the visionary duo, Dr. Brent Ridge and Josh Kilmer-Purcell.

Now, don't just stroll: adventure your way down Main Street! Hunt for hidden gems at Cobbler and Company and discover the botanical delights of Sharon Sprigs. Delve into the past at the Sharon Historical Museum and Schoolhouse, where life in yesteryear Sharon Springs springs to life. Fancy a little direction? Follow the architectural walking tour, where each building has a story itching to be told.

Once you've filled your bags and camera roll, cruise back to Route 20 and head east-more enchanting vistas and quaint corners of New York await!

The Cobleskill Loop Head back to Route 20 and steer east for about 5 miles until you hit the scenic crossroads of Routes 20 and 145 at Sharon Hillwelcome to the Cobleskill Loop! Dip south on Route 145, weaving through fields where horses graze and barns dot the landscape, leading you to the village of Cobleskill, nestled in since 1752. This quaint village, sparked to life by a grist mill owner named Jacob Kobel, now thrives around SUNY Cobleskill College of Agriculture and Technology, a beacon of agricultural prowess for over a century.

Not just a college town, Cobleskill beams during the Schoharie County Sunshine Fair, where Victorianstyle buildings frame the historic fairgrounds. Keep your journey alive by cruising east on Route 7 to Howes Cave, a treasure trove of cultural heritage with the Iroquois Museum and the subterranean wonders of Howe Caverns and Secret Caverns.

As you venture through Central Bridge, tip your hat to the spirit of innovation at the birthplace of George Westinghouse, the mind behind the railway air brake and a key player in electrifying America. Continue to Route 30A south, and let the picturesque Schoharie Valley unfold before you—a canvas of rural charm and history ready to be explored.

Visit the Valley while you're traveling south, take a moment to absorb the sights and sounds of this historically lush and agriculturally bustling Schoharie Valley. With the Schoharie Creek winding its way north to the Mohawk River, your adventure begins less than 5 miles into the picturesque hamlet of Central Bridge. Here, shift gears east onto Route 7/30A and cruise southward, where the land is as rich in history as it is in harvest.

First stop? The Apple Barrel Store & Cafe at the end of Route 30A—a charming country shop where unique gifts and scrumptious meals await. This spot marks the beginning of the Timothy Murphy Trail, named after the local sharpshooter who changed the tide of the American Revolution by taking out General Fraser at the Battle of Saratoga.

Dubbed "The Breadbasket of the American Revolution," this valley was the spot where George Washington's troops stood guard over vital food supplies destined for the revolutionary forces. Today, the valley is a patchwork of farms cultivating everything from livestock to leafy greens, and a host of vibrant veggies in between.

Continue on Route 30 to discover Schoharie Valley Farms - affectionately dubbed the Carrot Barn by locals. Here, the Ball family tills the same fertile soil that has fed generations, preserving a rich agricultural legacy. As you roll into the village of Schoharie, don't miss the Old Stone Fort Museum. This 1772 churchturned-fortress stands as a bastion of local lore, having withstood British attacks in 1780.

Press on south to Middleburgh, sprinkled with quaint shops and cozy eateries, then keep gliding through the expansive Schoharie Valley. Along the way, make a must-stop at Vroman's Nose, the quintessential Schoharie Experience. This iconic landmark offers trails for every type of adventurer, whether you're looking for a vigorous climb or leisure stroll, all culminating in a breathtaking view of the Schoharie Valley beyond. Not far, in North Blenheim, the historic Blenheim Covered Bridge stretches gracefully over Schoharie Creek, near the home of the New York Power Authority. While you're visiting, pop into the NYPA Visitors Center on the grounds for a Contnued on page 35

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Further south lies Mine Kill State Park, and just beyond, the submerged echoes of old Gilboa in the Schoharie Reservoir—NYC's watery larder. Finally, trek north about 10 miles on Route 30 to reconvene with Route 20 just west of Esperance. From historical sites to agricultural delights, this valley trip stitches together a vibrant tapestry of rural New York charm, making each mile a memory to cherish.

The Arboretum Excursion Buckle up for a green getaway! From the junction of Route 30 and Route 20, swing west on Route 20 for a mile. Cross the Schoharie Creek, then make your way north on Charleston Street, following signs straight to the leafy paradise of the Landis Arboretum. This 548-acre botanical wonder boasts flourishing plants, towering trees, ancient forests, and trails that beckon for a hike. Pack a picnic and make a day of it! Once you've had your fill of flora, cruise east on Route 20's Scenic Byway to Delanson in Schenectady County.



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
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SCHOHARIE COLONIAL HERITAGE ASSOCIATION

History: One of our first projects was the restoration of the oldest existing buildings in Schoharie, the 1743 Palatine House. Also known as the Old Lutheran Parsonage, the Palatine House is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and was one of the few frame buildings spared when Brandt raided Schoharie during the Revolutionary War and burned the village to the ground. The Association has also acquired and restored abandoned buildings on Depot Lane in Schoharie. The buildings had not been in use since the demise of the Middleburgh and Schoharie Railroads. For several years now SCHA volunteers, with the aid of New York State Department of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation and O'Connor Foundation Grants. have worked to develop the Station House, Freight Shed, Engine House, Weigh Station and the Old Mill Building into a historical complex -The Schoharie Valley Railroads Museum.

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


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
